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I, Annamarie V. Sandecki, former Director of *Tiffany & Co. Archives* and founding member of the *International Antique Jewelers Association Expertise (IAJA Expertise)*, hereby declare that, in my opinion, the piece described below is a genuine Tiffany item:

***Pendant/Brooch With Removable Associated Necklace
Platinum, Yellow Gold, Sapphire, Diamonds
Tiffany & Co., New York, circa 1915-1933***

A cushion-shaped pendant/brooch set with a 14.52 ct modified brilliant-cut sapphire. Each corner of the pendant/brooch set with a line of 3 graduated diamonds (12 total). Between each line of diamonds, an outline of millegrain platinum filigree. The pendant/brooch back with a pin clasp and two hooks to which a chain of filigree platinum links alternating with diamonds (30 total) is attached.

On the main floor of Tiffany & Co's 37 th Street store was a unique area called the "Art Jewelry Department". The merchandise on display reflected Louis Comfort Tiffany (1847-1932) design aesthetic, especially his interest in exotic cultures and color. From 1914-1933 Meta K. Overbeck (1879-1936) was head designer, responsible for executing Louis Comfort Tiffany's vision.

Accompanied by a copy of GIA report 6233863962, dated February 10, 2026 stating the sapphire exhibits no indication of heating and was mined in Sri Lanka.

Sapphire

Sapphire is mostly thought of as blue in color, however the name refers to every color of the mineral corundum, except red (which is ruby). The name comes from the Greek saphēros, which means "bright blue stone." Ancient Mediterranean cultures prized sapphire above all other gems. Today, the most highly prized blue sapphire is sourced from Kashmir, India. Other significant sources include Myanmar, Thailand, Sri Lanka, and Madagascar.
